### DEAN RODELL

Perceptive Natura (Compound)
When the dancefloor requires the pounding of a severe ill-tempered percussive monster, then reach for the vinyl pharmacy that is Germany. Known for unremittingly brutal soundscapes and brilliantly engineered productions, Compound has gained a solid reputation. This EP shuttles the label's direction into the future as Mr. Rodell infuses hauntingly phantasmal tribal enchantments into a deeply set stereo perspective. Thickly laid distortion promotes anxiety atop the well distinguished yet heavily layered mix. Complex drum fills reign throughout, as a heavily compressed low-end receives a meticulous filter cleansing. Few extended breaks accompany this crunchy piece of thick wax, while the progression continues to drive ahead in a steady, forthcoming manner. Beware however, this release has been known to frighten glow stick waving, Vicks inhaling, tent pant-wearing, plastic jewelry-weaving Snuggle Bear rave kids. 5/5 (Praxis)

# BACKGROUND RECORDS

Andy Vaz, the owner and managing director of the minimal techno label Background is a lead-ing figure in the underground house and tech-no scene in Dusseldorf, Germany. Initially, Andy's Interest in music laid in early American hip hop acts like Boogie Down Productions, Doug E. Fresh, and Eric B. & Rakim. But after a few trips to Detroit in the early 1990's and meetings with the likes of Juan Atkins and the UR posse, everything changed. For the next few years Andy spent his time experiencing Detroit and Chicago based techno and house music. Not long after that in 1996, Andy launched Background Music as a platform for his newly found love. "My idea was to launch a label that would support minimal music in all its various forms and functions. It was also important that the label would be an international label representing the movement on a global level." According to Vaz, "The label has thus far been focusing on the EP/vinyl releases but we will soon venture into albums on both vinyl and CDs." Some of Background's upcoming projects include singles and an album from Vaz himself, the fourth installment of *Futuristic* Experiments featuring tracks and mixes from Akufen, Sutekh, Dean DeCosta, Geoff White, Submania, Rhythm Maker, Jeff Milligan, and Todd Sines among others, and a full-length artist album from London based producer Portable. ### OSCAR MULERO

Learning To Be A Machine (Warm Up) Spanish spinner and producer Oscar Mulero (or is it Orwell Mulero?) gives rise to some dystopian techno on Learning to be a Machine. "Beyond Pit Lane" has solid kick drums and percussion, but the ghosts-ofhumanity style effects make this one very creepy cut. On the B-side, "The Refueler" also haunts with ominous mechanical hums. And finally, "Robert Pain," with its music box melody, acts as a creepy counterpoint to it all. 4/5 (Yuri Wuensch)

### **CHRIS LIBERATOR & DARC MARC**

Untitled (Maximum Minimum) London's acid godfather surfaces once again to join forces with Pure Noise's label head and install an LP reminiscent of both artists' previous work. The mix drives rapidly ahead with a dominant percussive edge, while the rather tame 303 loops instill positive ear-gasmic energy. Another solid release for this UK duo, although the cut lacks that 180-gram weight you may expect from across the pond. 3/5 (Praxis)

### THERMOBEE & ANT

Sweeper/Sonic (Bang On) The production at Kinetic Studios must never end, since this techno duet continues to pump out release after release—almost two cuts a month. Classic ANT workings are found here, as a reminiscent trance progression holds down this progressive techno funk fort. Full of 909s and resonating synth melodies, this 12" is geared towards the event's peak moment. 4/5 (Praxis)

Pressure Steps (Mirror) Spreading out thick layers of decadent techhouse, this artist twiddles away relentless silklike funk that is sure to leave a memorable impression. A standard format rhythm section secures the groove, as an aggressive rolling bassline lures the listener in. Lots of pitch tricks throughout the mix, but the magic lies in the deep bass patch tones. 3/5 (Praxis)

### DARC MARC & MATT CRAVEN

The Bystander (Pure Noise) From the label's chief operator comes a foreign imprint full of domestic hip hop zest. A little more docile than the previous installations, but the cymbals sizzle and shimmer atop a somewhat hostile tribal assortment. Dominant and colossal, the kick pounds on to satisfy that need for techno brawn, 3/5 (Praxis)

# **CHRIS LEIBING**

The Biggest 10" I Have Ever Seen RMXS (CLR)

I knew it wouldn't be long before famed DJ Rush had a whack at a remix of this classic track, and without question the reworking has gained quality restitution. Hard and swanky, the tune contains a balanced allotment of tasteful distortion, blissful reverse cymbals and filtered-down, saturated vocal twists. Come for the original, stay for the remix. 4/5 (Praxis)

### **ARIL BRIKHA**

Departure In Time (Transmat) Aril Brikha follwos up his full-length with an LP containing previously unreleased music. Rolling basslines clear the path for a calypsostyle groove that sports a funky atmosphere and delicate keys that complement the

abstract kick programming. Flip for a more standard tech-house, mass-crowd-minded episode. 3/5 (Praxis)

### THE ADVENT

Sooner Or Later (Tortured Records) The Cisco kid is back at it once again, this time with a slightly alternative agenda. Tensionbuilding, emotion-evoking chords hold the foundation stable while the classic, distorted, over-driven Advent ride fulfills your unremitting techno craving. 4/5 (Praxis)

### **GAETANO PARISIO**

Suprema EP (Conform)

Quality assurance is Parisio's essential attribute. Delivering an immense sound, this mix embraces a percussion section composed of polyrhythmic synth drums and a perpetual, hard low end. A dreamy yet taunting synth drone lies beneath the surface tension to ensure that the audio canvass has ample depth. Great for a hard Midwest set, although creepy enough to lurk throughout the world's underground. 4/5 (Praxis)

### ADAM JAY VS. MIKE PARKER

Counteractions (Azure Records) The third release from this Indianapolis-based label hits the decks with just as much stimulus as its funk-laden predecessors. Carl Cox and DJ Dan come to mind on this bangin', tech-house install-ment especially effective in a bump 'n' grind-oriented house dub. Just enough slam, interwoven with fundamental filter builds, sets a platform for sensual turntable romance. 3/5 (Praxis)

### MARK GREEN PRES MG

Die Maschimen Laufen (Stigmata RMX) (Solar)

As German techno continues to define the hostile trend of pleasurably hard noise, this title serves a healthy portion of contentment for your 1200s to groove to. Layered thick with residual percussive melodies, the progression endures the straight eighth feel for which our beloved Mr. Leibing is renowned. Although it encompasses dark hues, the attitude here remains optimistic. A meat-andpotatoes techno release. 4/5 (Praxis)

### **MATEO MURPHY**

Brigning It Back EP (Turbo Recordings) It's amazing what a good producer can do with a few sounds. On Bringing It Back, Murphy leads off with some nice 80s electro synth bells, then shifts into a searing acid line, interspersing only one or two percussive lines throughout the whole progression. "Jack to Jack" is a great floor filler with a bouncy kick drum and progressive drum layers. Good stuff. 4/5 (Steve-O)

# PAN AMERICAN

Renzo (Vertical Form) Chicago's Mark Nelson, renown for his work as guitarist and vocalist with drone/post-rock outfit Labradford, appears once again as Pan American; This time for top UK electronic imprint Vertical Form. *Renzo* kicks off with "Running Dog (Reborn)," a crispy, ultra deep tune filled with pulsing atmospherics, splashes of spring reverb, and hypnotic bass movements. After a short ambient interlude with "Toy Triggers," the B side comes alive with the warm and fuzzy static of *Renzo*, Backed with thick sub-bass, panning echos and melancholic keys. If you like your Basic Channel and Rhythm and Sound with a side of Deep Chord, then Renzo is just what you've been looking for. 5/5 (Dean DeCosta)
